- I require a pilot. When made by fishing vessels operating in close proximity on the fishing grounds it means: I am hauling nets.
- H* I have a pilot onboard.
- I am altering my course to port.
- I am on fire and have dangerous cargo onboard; keep well clear of me.
- I wish to communicate with you.
- You should stop your vessel instantly.
- My vessel is stopped and making no way through the water.

- My engines are going astern.
- Keep clear of me; I am engaged in pair trawling.
- You are running into danger.
- I require assistance.

- Stop carrying out your intentions and watch for my signals.



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

Lateral Aids Marking the Sides of Channels as Seen When Entering from Seaward




Port hand aids are green with green lights. Starboard hand aids are red with red lights.

Note: White lights are no longer used on port and starboard hand aids in waters used by international mariners. However, in the western rivers including the Mississippi River system above Baton Rouge, white lights may still be used on crossing aids.




Red and white buoys are spherical or have a red spherical topmark.

Small Craft, Gale, Storm and Hurricane Warnings




Lateral Aids Marking the Sides of Channels as Seen When Entering from Seaward


Port Side Odd Numbers Starboard Side Even Numbers

Aids used to mark these areas or systems will be all yellow:

- Ocean Data Acquisition Systems (ODAS)
- Traffic Separation Schemes where conventional channel marking would be confusing
- Dredging Buoys when conventional channel markings would be confusing
- Fish Net areas
- Spoil Grounds
- Military Exercise zones
- Anchorage areas

Light Aids will show yellow lights.

Orange and white regulatory markers and information markers will not be changed.
